Erdogan, Gulen, His Palace, His Compound

Citizen – Emperor – Erdogan has found a way, he thinks, to deflect attention from his billion-dollar pleasure-palace, built in the worst possible taste, and that is <u>to encourage</u> others to focus on the supposedly luxurious estate, in rural Pennsylvania, of his arch-enemy and onetime supporter Fethuleh <u>Gulen.</u> But Gulen does not live in such a palace, Gulen is, according to reports, a recluse and an ascetic, and this must drive Erdogan crazy.

Which dictator does Erdgoan most resemble? Yes, a cross between Nicolae Ceausescu and Idi Amin – that's Recep Tayyip Erdogan.

And do you remember how they ended up?
