Now, if you click on www.scholarofthehouse.org (not .com), you will arrive at his current website: www.searchforbeauty.org. That website is awe-inspiring, in the sense that it inspires a certain kind of awe. So do read as much as you can stand at www.search for beauty.org.

At that site, you will find out About Us:

Beauty and Reasonableness are the defining principles of the

school of thought of scholar and Islamic jurist, Khaled Abou El Fadl. Professor Abou El Fadl has dedicated a lifetime to the study of Islam, Islamic jurisprudence, Shari'ah (the path to and from God), international law and human rights, among many other subjects.
