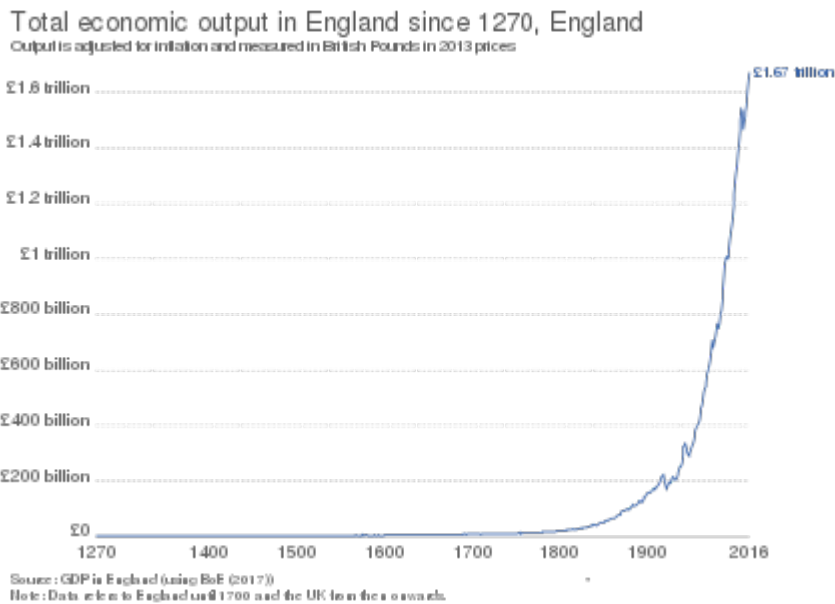
Everywhere we've fallen short of these high hopes. "The scheming little human mind," as Paul Bowles expressed it, is always looking for ways to dominate others.
