Something nostalgic for the VE Day anniversary

It's a bank holiday in Britain today; usually these are a Monday but this year the May Day holiday which would have been earlier this week was moved to Friday (today) to accommodate celebrations for the 75th anniversary of VE Day (Victory in Europe)

Anne Shelton also had a presence in America in the later 40s and 50s. In England she sang with the famous dance band of Ambrose (Bert Ambrose & His Orchestra.) Except when Glenn Miller was in the country; then she sang with him. She was younger than Dame Vera, and died
